## A NOTE FROM OUR DIRECTORS

In 2019, LHC continued to grow, made a larger and more significant impact in the community, and gained new volunteer staff and board members with a passion for our mission. Our fiscal year changed from the calendar year to July 1-June 30 to better align with our program schedule. We also renamed and rebranded our events to better educate people about each of our five main programs, their purpose, and each program's impact in the community. Little Hands Can remains dedicated to inspiring and empowering children to better their communities by connecting them with local service opportunities. We continue to provide our City Stewards (formerly known as Community Events), Happy Helpers, Kindness Camp, and Learning Leaders (formerly known as the Grow and CARE After School) programs. #### We **Empower**

Little Hands Can is an organization made up of passionate volunteers wanting to make a difference. By encouraging kindness and helpfulness early on, we can lay the foundation for a future generation who is more thoughtful, inclusive and altruistic. In order to accomplish this, **our mission is to inspire and empower children to better their community by connecting them with local service opportunities**.

Since Little Hands Can's conception in 2015, children and their families have completed

- over 270 community service project events
- over 14,186 volunteer hours

#### We Change Lives

In addition to connecting thousands of children ages 0-18 with service opportunities, we also benefit the community at large through our service projects. Because of the generous donors who support our programs, each year Little Hands Can has been able to expand and diversify its reach and continuously increase the impact we have on our community. Since 2015, LHC families have:

- Served 15,944 community members through our programs including 1,702 seniors in assisted living facilities, 836 animals, and 13,406 adults and children experiencing homelessness, food insecurity, and many other hardships
- Organized 67 park and garden improvement projects benefiting thousands in our community
- Compiled 1200 hygiene, school, and mini first aid kits for organizations such as the Eugene Mission, Refugee Resettlement Coalition of Lane County, Catholic Community Services, and Bags of Love
- Made 250 items (e.g., cat carriers, cards, blankets, toys) for animals
- Created **5000** holiday cards for the homeless
- Made 400 items such as blankets, bracelets, and cards for hospitalized children and their families
- And so much more!

## **OUR IMPACT**

#### **City Stewards**

In our City Stewards program, we worked with and served over 20 organizations through our community service projects.

In 2019, 1,422 volunteers completed 37 service projects totalling over 1,801 community service hours through our City Stewards program. This is nearly twice the number of volunteers and community service hours that we completed in 2018! 26 of these service projects were community garden and park improvement projects that benefitted our entire community. We also served 979 other members of our community, including 50 seniors and 17 rescued animals through the remaining 11 projects. Additionally, with the help of church groups, school groups, and countless others, we made over 900 holiday cards which we placed on each bed at the Eugene Mission on Christmas Eve.

Our community service projects included, but were not limited to: gardening, painting and landscaping for the City of Eugene Parks and Open Spaces, making dog treats and cards for Northwest Dog Project, landscaping at Mt. Pisgah, helping in FOOD for Lane County's Grassroots Garden, cleaning and landscaping at Riverhouse Outdoor, cleaning the Very Little Theatre, painting kindness rocks at the Toolbox Project, preparing Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners for the nearly 500 people without homes who utilize the Eugene Mission, and making ornaments for Womenspace, an organization dedicated to ending partner violence.





#### **Happy Helpers:**

In our Happy Helpers Playdates program, we engage seniors who are in an assisted living enivironment for a variety of reasons, including Memory Care. Many of the residents are Veterans.

In 2019, LHC's preschoolers and toddlers with their caregivers completed 35 service projects totalling over 681 community service hours through our Happy Helpers program. These projects served 1,144 national and local community members, including 433 seniors and 137 rescued animals.

Our service projects included, but were not limited to: creating graduation awards for children in Haiti, making Get Well cards, decorating placemats for Meals on Wheels, making dog and cat toys and carriers for Greenhill Humane Society, making blankets and cards for hospitalized children, making pillowcases for wounded soldiers, and making Christmas cards to put on every pillow at the Eugene Mission.

## **OUR IMPACT**

#### **Kindness Camp:**

This year we were able to expand our summer 2019
Kindness Camps to two sessions, one for 4-5 year olds and
the other for 6-8 year olds! These amazing 40 children
completed 15 service projects in which they compiled,
collected, or handmade items benefitting 10 different
organizations. Their projects served 285 community
members including 25 seniors and 16 rescued animals.
This included:

- 1. Conducting a food drive in which they collected over 100 non-perishable food items for FOOD for Lane County.
- 2. Making 25 placemats for Meals on Wheels.
- 3. Compiling 31 school kits for refugees for the Refugee Resettlement Coalition of Lane County.
- 4. Compiling 59 mini first aid kits for the Eugene Mission to distribute to those without homes.
- 5. Reusing 45 plastic yogurt containers.
- 6. Planting 30 plants to help the earth and the bees.
- 7. Painting 30 kindness rocks to hide in the community.
- 8. Making 16 cat toys for the Greenhill Humane Society.
- Greating and delivering 31 friendship keychains to other campers.
- 10. Making 15 thank you cards for parents and caregivers.

#### **Learning Leaders**

LHC partners with the BEST (Boosting & Enriching Students Today)
Afterschool Program to provide a community service elective at local
elementary schools in Eugene, Oregon. The BEST program targets
underserved students, including children who are homeless, in transitional
housing, and English Language Learners. Students in the BEST Afterschool
Program are more diverse than the 4J district-wide student body as a
whole. 45% of BEST attendees are students of color, and almost 20% speak
a language other than English at home.

In the service elective, students learn about different issues in the community, participate in classroom service projects, and learn more about local nonprofits. Lesson plans include books, music, games, discussions, and service activities related to a particular nonprofit and the community need it addresses. These activities are paired with age-appropriate discussion and multimedia on topics such as safe shelter, protecting the environment, building a strong community, protecting animals, or helping neighbors.

188 students are served each year in our LHC community service elective, and each can complete between 3 and 20 hours of service during a school year. During the 2018-2019 school year, our Learning Leaders completed 893 hours of service and served over 900 community members through their projects. Students benefit from the LHC Afterschool Program as they gain more confidence, self-efficacy, and tolerance as they increase their understandings of social issues. Individuals served by the local non-profits benefit, as well.

## **OUR IMPACT**

#### **Young Yogis Service:**

In September of 2019 Little Hands Can launched a new program called Young Yogis Service! Our yoga instructor, Ginger, led us on a mindfulness journey that helped us be more present and compassionate towards ourselves so we could in turn share that same compassion with those around us and our environment. We finished with a park clean up and enjoyed smoothies generously donated by Vitality Bowls. Such a fun and special event that we hope to bring back in the future!

During this event 43 volunteers completed 43 community service hours. Our entire community now benefits from the painted park benches and trashless grounds of Mangan Park.


## OUR GROWTH

Little Hands Can started with two Eugene moms with a passion for helping others who wanted to instill that love of service in their children. Not finding many organizations that accepted toddler-age volunteers, they decide to create an organization that would seek out service opportunities for young children and make them accessible to as many families as possible.


Little Hands Can's first community event was held in June of 2015 at Skinner's Butte Park putting together mini first aid kits for the Eugene Mission. Since then we've expanded to include many more community events as well as other programs ranging from an afterschool program to play dates to summer camps to school/church visits and more. The website is stocked with easy service ideas for families to do on their own time, as well as inspirational examples of kids engaging in service around the world, so that any child anywhere can feel like they can do something to help others.

Over the last four years, we have partnered with local charities, organizations, and retirement facilities to complete over 270 community service projects and have engaged and helped thousands of community members through our volunteer work.




**Total Service Hours Completed**
